

<u>Scariest</u>: Entering new marinas with tight corners in strong winds and/or currents (Note: single engine, no thruster)

<u>Hardest</u>: Sharing tight quarters* under way for months, making decisions daily, communicating effectively

* Many Moons is 34 feet long. Two feet bigger, or an enclosed flybridge, would make a difference. But you don't need a huge boat! Smaller boats are easier to maneuver.


